I took the report card **back to my teacher** and she immediately knew that my mom didn't sign it, that I forged it.

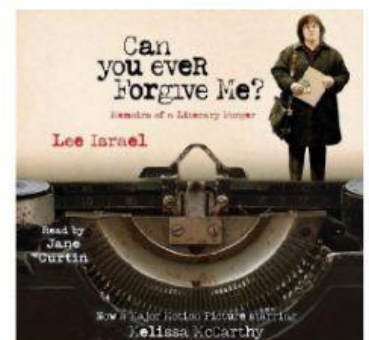
The teacher then told me, "Well, I'm gonna call your mother tonight and let her know."
