

ZERO AND FIRST CONDITIONAL

Read the following sentences and answer the questions below.

If the lizard **puts** a food somewhere **wet**, its skin **pulls** the water up and over its whole body.

The lizard **hides** if it **gets** scared.

If we **are** successful, the device **will** provide water for people who live in very dry environments.

Conditional sentences have two parts. Match the parts with their functions.

If - clause

Describes the result of the even.

main clause

Describes a **possible** event.

When the conditional sentence begins with the if-clause, what do we use between the two parts?

Next to each characteristic write “zero” “first” or “both” in order to identify the conditional that is being described.

1. Present tense is used in both if-clause and main clause.
2. We can use either the word if or when for stating a condition.
