	1. alibi	A. What today describes one's self-esteem simply meant "I" in Latin (first person singular pronoun).
	2. agenda	B. This word is used to describe a requirement demanded by one party to another, often as a threat of retaliation or war.
	3. ego	C. Meaning "I forbid" in Latin, this right is used to stop the process of a decision such as the signature of a new law. In the U.K. it is called the Royal Consent.
	4. acumen	D. The thing you desperately need if you are suspected of some shenanigans; it means "elsewhere" in Latin, and if you were elsewhere, how could you have stolen the cookies?
	5. quid pro quo	E. The biggest
	6. gratis	F. Literally "I see" in Latin, the word is used in English to describe any recorded film, short clip, or an old VHS cassette.
	7. ultimatum	G. This Latin word simply means "road", but it is mostly used today to say "by way of" or "passing through".
	8. veto	H. Meaning <i>kindness</i> in Latin, this word is used in English as <i>free of charge, at no cost</i> .
	9. vice versa	I. In Latin, the expression was used to describe a document that had been verified, literally a paper that had been seen.
	10. via	J. The noun describing someone's quick perception and sharp spirit comes from the Latin word meaning "sharp point".
	11. visa	K. The Latin phrase for "the position having been reversed".
	12. video	L. The smallest
	13. maximum	M. From the Latin verb "agere" meaning <i>to act</i> ; it is used to describe a list of items that might be discussed during a meeting, a plan of action to be done, or the ulterior motives of a particular person.
	14. minimum	N. The term was originally used by apothecaries when they would substitute one ingredient for another. Today it means "I'll scratch your back if you scratch mine".
