Exercise 1: After reading and understanding the text, listen carefully to the three corresponding Gregorian excerpts and specify to which melodic style each of them corresponds.

Gregorian chant is a music that was conceived to pray. The ideal auditorium to listen to this music would therefore be a monastery or a cathedral. Depending on the way of singing the text, three melodic styles are distinguished in Gregorian chant.

- **Syllabic style:** each syllable of text is intoned with a note.
- **Pneumatic style:** each syllable is intoned with more than one note, but not exceeding four or five.
- **Melismatic style:** each syllable of text is intoned over many notes.
