We don't have a space between two different words in email addresses:

info@**fastshop**.com = info at fast shop, **all one word**, dot com

Tip | British and American addresses

British and American English use different words in addresses:

postcode (British English) = zip code (American English)

postal address (British English) = mailing address (American English)

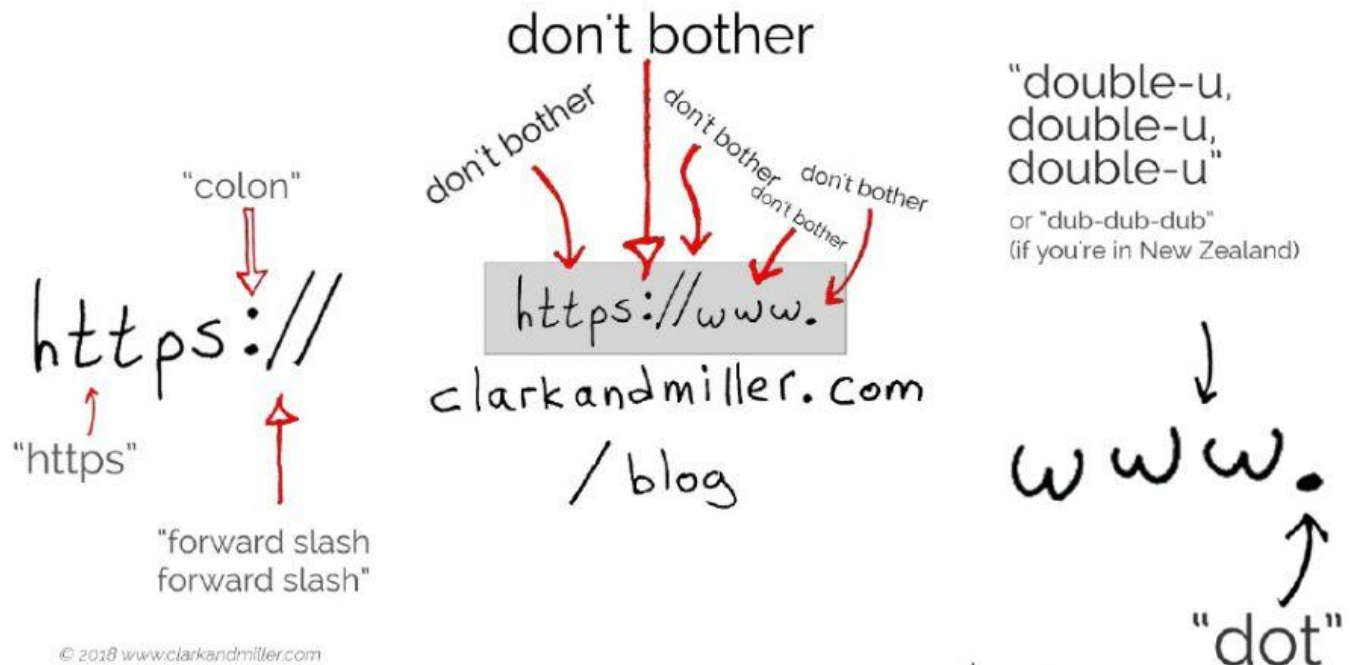
How to ask for someone's email address

"Could I get your email address?"

"Would you mind telling me your email address?"

"Could you tell me your email address?"

If you want to be super polite, just add a "please" to any of these.



How to ask for a website address

"What's the web address?"

"What's the website address?"

"Can I get the website address?"

- = dash
_ = underscore
: = colon
; = semi-colon
= hashtag

Most emails are written in lowercase, but if we want to check that we can ask:

"Lower case or upper case?"

"That's all lower case, right?"

"Any capitals?"

"Any upper-case letters?"

Here are some useful expressions to use with emails.

- What's your email address?
- Could I get your email address, please?
- What's your company email address, please?
- Is that all lowercase?
- Is that all one word?
- I'll send the email as soon as I get into the office.
- Did you get the email I sent you last week?
- I'm sorry but I haven't had time to reply to the email yet.
- Could you forward me that email, please?
- Could you forward the email to everyone on the list, please?

A: Could you spell that out for me, please?

B: Yes, that's P for parrot, E for egg and T for time – PET.
