

Subject/verb agreement

- WITH PREPOSITIONAL PHRASES -

- Subject-verb agreement means that a subject and its verb must be both singular or plural: A singular subject takes a singular verb, but with a prepositional phrase.
- Subjects and verbs must AGREE with one another in number (singular or plural). Thus, if a subject is singular, its verb must also be singular; if a subject is a plural, its verb must also be plural.
- In the present tense, nouns and verbs form plurals in opposite ways: nouns add an s to the singular form; verbs REMOVE the s from the singular form.
- A prepositional phrase is composed of: a preposition followed by a noun or pronoun object. The prepositional phrase can be either a noun, gerund, or clause. Some prepositions are: *in, at, on, under, next to, for, over, of, up, etc.*
- The verb of a sentence must always agree with the subject of the sentence, not with the object of a preposition.
Example: Under the tree **are** several flowers (In this case, the verb must be plural "are" because the subject "flowers" is plural)
- Consequently, the subject of a sentence is never contained in a prepositional phrase.
- Sometimes, prepositional phrases come between the subject and verb of a sentence.

Example: The boy at the door **is** my brother.

When prepositional phrases come between the subject and verb, it can lead you to choose the incorrect verb form.

Example: The players on the baseball team **were** disappointed.

- A prepositional phrase merely adds information to the subject, but it does not change whether the noun is singular or plural.

Example: The engineer at the controls **is** working hard.
