WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A FRIEND?

This is what happened to Kennedy. It was break time and she was chatting with her friends when this boy ran round the corner really fast and went straight into her. She put her hand to her mouth and noticed some **blood**. The boy said it was her fault – that was horrible! Her friend, Rachel, wasn't afraid of arguing with the boy. She immediately shouted, 'No, you're wrong. I saw everything!'

It can be **challenging** to find true friendship, but Kennedy **recognised** it – and so did many of you. We asked for your opinions and ideas about true friendship. You sent us over 100,000 **replies**!

For many, what you *do* for a friend is more important than what you say. Denise writes about a friend who admitted to something that she didn't do. It was all about a silly drawing of a teacher. Her friend had to go to the head teacher's office and got extra homework. Was she sensible? Probably not, but she was a good friend.

It's not just what your friends do for you, though; it's what you do for them. Gary remembers the time he was at football practice and his friend really wanted to be in the team. 'I told the teacher I was going away at the weekend. I wasn't honest but my friend got a place in the team.'

However, there's one thing you don't agree about: how many best friends can you have? Molly says she has one best friend and all her other friends are 'close'. Kaitlyn, 14, says it depends on your age. 'When I was younger, I was interested in having lots of best friends. But now I have just one best friend.' But that's the girls: what about the boys? Well, it seems that you generally have lots of friends but you don't **worry** about best friends, or close friends. You just have ... *friends*.
