Listening Strategy: Sentence stress

In listening passages, stressed words can indicate the content words of the passage. The unstressed words often only provide the grammatical context. Thus, if you identify the stressed words in a passage, you will usually be able to identify the essential meaning of that passage. This strategy is most useful in Parts 3 and 4 of the test.

How to Identify Stressed Words:

- Stressed words are often said in a longer, louder, higher, or clearer way.
- Stressed words are sometimes repeated, or used after a pause.
- Stressed words are most often nouns, verbs, adjectives, and adverbs.

When listening for stressed words, do NOT try to understand every spoken word. Not every word is important. Trying to understand every word will slow down your listening and may cause you to miss important information. Listen to the way the words are being said.
