1. She never *understanded* (1) *her parents* (2) when they told her *to come* (3) home at ten o'clock when all the children *were still* (4) in the yard.
2. The children *have already finished* (1) *the work in the garden*, (2) and now they *play* (3) with *their friends*. (4)
3. *Many* (1) children visited the *nearest* (2) stadium *to see* (3) the football matches and they usually ate *many* (4) pop-corn during the game.
4. The heavy rain in Stavropol *brought* (1) *so much* (2) water that *a lot of* (3) animals like *cows and sheeps* (4) were moved to other places.
5. She's got *a* (1) new pair of shoes, *isn't she* (2)? — Oh, yes. She *always buys* (3) *something* (4) new.

10. I wanted *to visit to* (1) my friends, who lived *in the country* (2) and *invited me to spend* (3) *a week or two* (4) in their house.
