EU NURSES FACE ENGLISH LANGUAGE TESTS



Nurses and midwives (0) _____ (*come*) to Britain from the EU will now need to prove they are fluent in English, under new rules. Until now, checks have only been applied to nurses from outside the EU. From now on any nurse applying to join the register from outside the UK will need to have an English language (1) _____ (*assess*). Tests will check listening, reading, writing and speaking (2) _____ (*fluent*).

The Nursing and Midwifery Council Chief Executive said: "The (3) _____ (*able*) to communicate effectively with patients is fundamental to patient (4) _____ (*safe*) and is a principle that is central to our code." 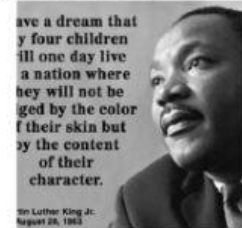

EARLY 'DREAM' SPEECH FOUND



Martin Luther King electrified the audience with his speech back in 1963 - but it wasn't the first time he (0) _____ delivered it. A recording of an earlier version of King's historic *I Have a Dream* speech, delivered to high school students in Rocky Mount in 1962, (17) _____ been discovered.
