POSITIVE

Yes

Did+ not +subject+ verb (base form)+complement.

No, I did not see your credit card last Wednesday.
No, she didn't cook last weekend.

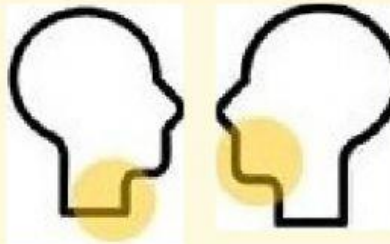
