Present continuous

We ⁴ **'ll pay** for dinner tonight.

Consumers ⁵ **won't drive** to supermarkets in the year 2030.

going to

I ⁶ **'m going to buy** a new T-shirt and jacket.

We ⁷ **aren't going to shop** here.

Future continuous

Don't phone Patricia at 7.00. She ⁸ **'ll be watching** that new TV series about marketing.

This time next year, my friends ⁹ **won't be working** in this shop.

RULES

- 1 We use this form when we plan or intend to do something in the future, but there isn't an exact date or time yet. **going to**
- 2 We use this form when we have organized something and there is an exact date or time. **present continuous**
- 3 We use this form for things which have a fixed timetable. **present simple**
- 4 We use this when we make a prediction about the future. **will**
- 5 We use this form when we talk about an action which will be in progress sometime in the future. **future continuous**
