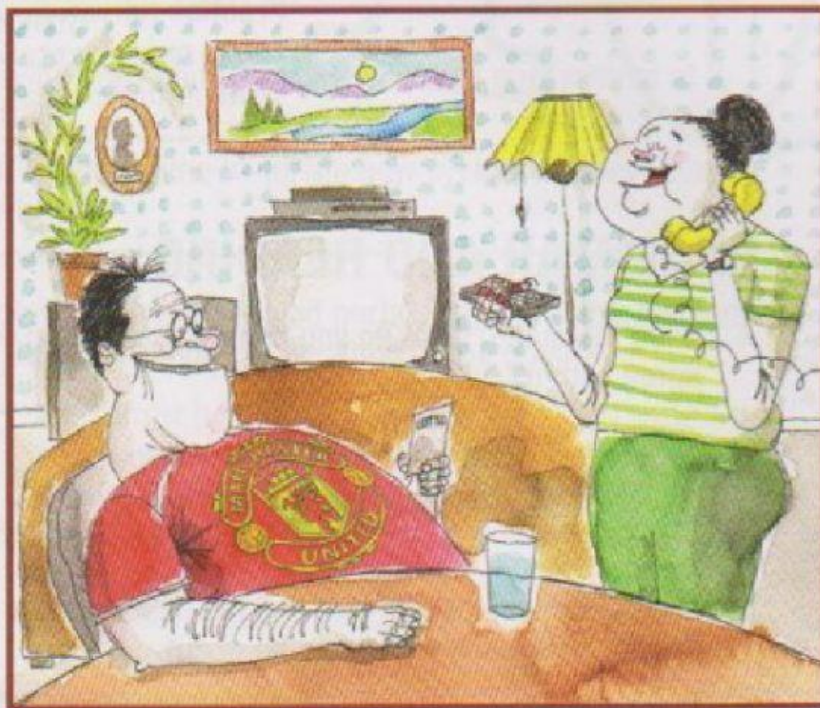

They own ¹ £106,000 house, drive ² small hatchback and holiday in ³ Spain. He supports Manchester United, is 1.79 m tall and weighs 80 kg. She is 1.6 m tall and weighs 66 kg.

During her life she will spend fifteen months on the phone and watch more than 40,000 hours of ⁴ television. Meet Mr and Mrs Average – proud parents of ⁵ 1.8 children and living in ⁶ medium-sized town in ⁷ south of England.

The Averages have a 50 percent chance of getting divorced. ⁸ couple are more interested in looking after ⁹ garden than DIY. Both work, earning about £800 between them ¹⁰ week. Their house is filled with most modern luxuries, including ¹¹ television and ¹² CD player.

The Averages have about seventy-five friends and will each walk 13,673 miles in their lives.

But they are quite unhealthy, liking nothing better than sitting down in front of the television with ¹³ takeaway meal and watching their favourite soap operas – ¹⁴ best, in their opinion, are *Coronation Street* and *Eastenders*.

They occasionally go to the cinema but they are not interested in theatre, ballet or opera. Both used to smoke, but have now given up. They believe in God, but do not go to ¹⁵ church, and are convinced they could one day win the lottery.

Mr Average will die at seventy-four, probably of heart disease, but his wife will make it to seventy-nine.

The Sinclair C5



1 Launched in United Kingdom in 1985, the Sinclair C5 was a battery-assisted tricycle
2 created by British inventor, Sir Clive Sinclair. The C5 was steered by the handlebar
3 beneath a driver's knees and powered by a small electric motor making it unnecessary
4 for the driver to pedal. C5's top speed of twenty-four km/h was the fastest allowed
5 in the UK without driving licence. The retail price was £399, plus £29 for delivery,
6 which was expensive for the time. Both media and the public ridiculed the C5 during
7 1980s and it was a commercial disaster, selling only around 12,000 units. In fact, the
8 design was an impractical one: from the beginning, there were the serious concerns
9 about the C5's safety in traffic because it was so low to ground. In addition to this, the
10 driver was exposed to the wind and the rain and the cold weather tended to shorten
11 battery life. The lack of gears and seat-to-pedal adjustment and the fact that a motor
12 overheated on the long hills, were also serious problems. The motor turned out to be
13 essentially useless for climbing hills, with even the gentle slopes requiring the driver to
14 pedal. Sinclair spent the millions of pounds on developing the C5 and its failure
15 bankrupted a company and cost him his reputation. It will long be remembered in the
16 UK as the spectacular and comic failure, but was Sir Clive's idea just ahead of its time?
