HIJACKED JETS DESTROY THE TWIN TOWERS

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

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NEW YORK, Sept. 12 In a horror sequence of destruction, terrorists hijacked two airlines and crashed them into the World Trade Center towers on September 11 that brought down towers.

All flights were grounded at Lindbergh Field as the nation's airline was shut down in the wake of what appeared to be coordinated terrorist attacks in New York and Washington. Security was heightened at government and military facilities and some buildings were evacuated.
