


# FIRST CONDITIONAL

### GOAL:

By the time you complete the exercises in this worksheet you will be able to:

- Identify the main ingredients needed to make a sandwich.
- Explain the steps to follow in order to make a sandwich using the first conditional.
- Create a set of instructions for making a sandwich that is clear and easy to follow.

### HOW TO MAKE SENTENCES WITH THE FIRST CONDITIONAL:

The first conditional is formed by combining two clauses: an if-clause and a result clause. The if-clause expresses the condition, while the result clause expresses the consequence. The structure of the first conditional is as follows:

If + subject + present tense, subject + will + base form of the verb

Example: If it rains, we will stay at home.

In this example, "if it rains" is the condition, and "we will stay at home" is the consequence.


Work with a partner to listen to the following list of ingredients to make a sandwich, then read the list out loud.

We could also use avocado, tomato, and lettuce to make a vegetarian sandwich, or use peanut butter and jelly to make a sweet and savory sandwich. There are so many options, we just need to decide what we're in the mood for!


