

Already	Yet
<b>The sentence</b> We use it in affirmative statements. It goes between the auxiliary verb and the perfect participle form.	<b>The sentence</b> We use it in interrogative and negative sentences. It goes at the end of the sentence.
<b>Examples:</b> <i>I have already sent you a message.</i> <i>Mary has already baked a cake.</i>	<b>Examples:</b> <i>Have you seen it yet?</i> <i>Kevin hasn't eaten any cheese yet.</i>
<b>Tenses</b> We use it with perfect tenses.	<b>Tenses</b> We use it with perfect tenses.
