First part

Thought groups and pausing

Below is an excerpt from novelist Chimamanda Adichie's speech, titled "The Danger of the Single Story" at TED Talks. Read the text by clicking the microphone, remembering to pause on the black slash, appropriate and thoughtful use of thought groups greatly improves intelligibility.

- 1) *I'm a storyteller and / I would like to tell you a few personal stories about / what I like to call the danger / of the single story.*

- 2) *I grew up on a university campus / in eastern Nigeria / My mother says that I started reading at the age of two.*

- 3) *Although I think four is probably close to the truth / so I was an early reader / and what I read / were British and American children's books.*

- 4) *I was also an early writer / and when I began to write / at about / the age of seven / stories in pencil with crayon illustrations that my poor mother was obligated to read.*

- 5) *I wrote exactly the kinds of stories I was reading / all my characters were white / and blue-eyed / they played in the snow / they ate apples / and they talked a lot about the weather.*

- 6) *How lovely it was / that the sun had come out / now this despite the fact / that I lived / in Nigeria.*

7) *I had never been outside Nigeria / we didn't have snow / we ate mangoes / and we never talked about the weather because there was no need to.*

6) Will be transformed / into an oasis of / freedom and justice I have a dream / that my four little children / will one day live in a nation.

7) Where they will not be judged by the color of their skin / but by the content of their character / I have a dream today!"
