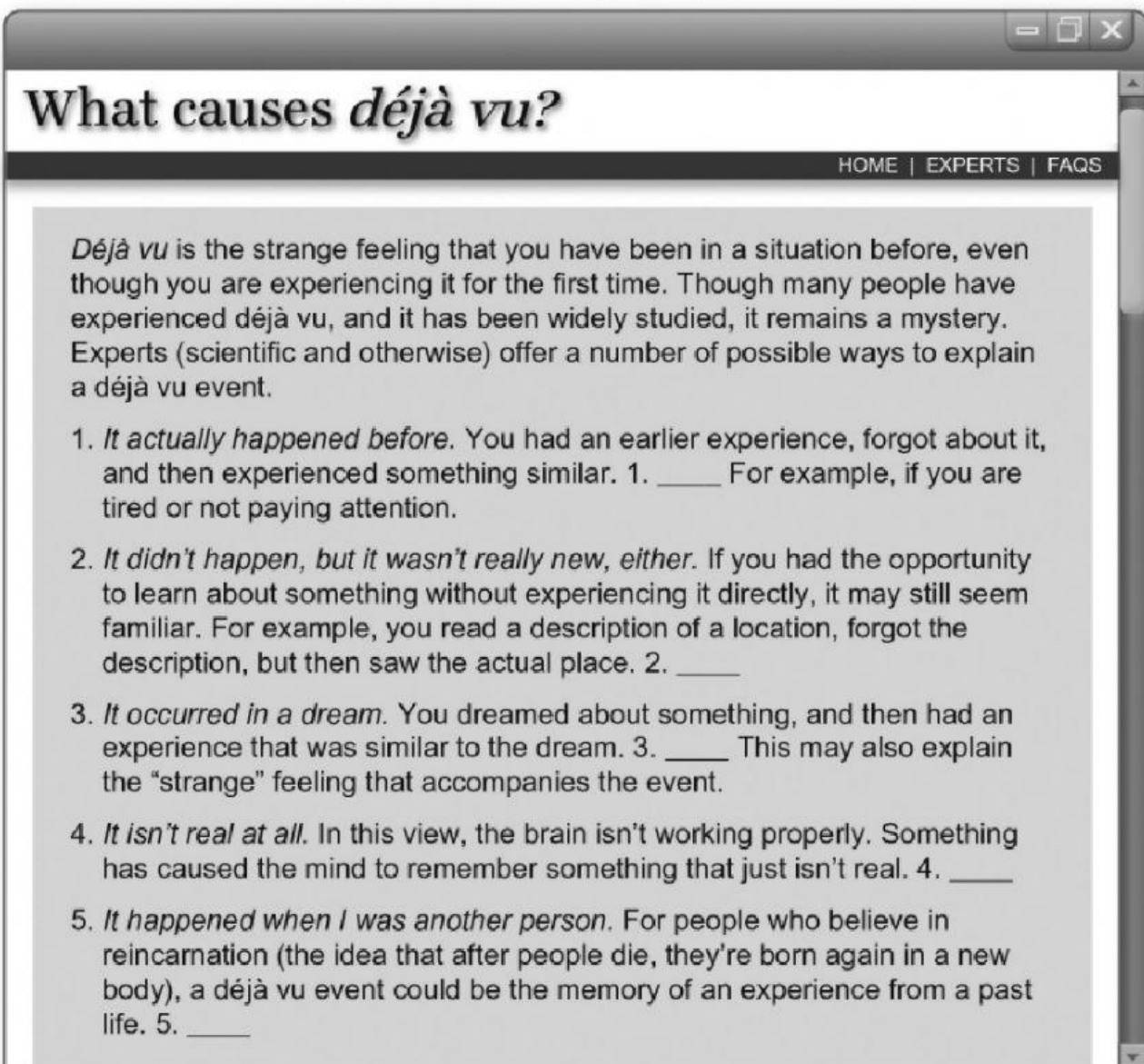

What causes *déjà vu*?

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Déjà vu is the strange feeling that you have been in a situation before, even though you are experiencing it for the first time. Though many people have experienced *déjà vu*, and it has been widely studied, it remains a mystery. Experts (scientific and otherwise) offer a number of possible ways to explain a *déjà vu* event.

1. *It actually happened before.* You had an earlier experience, forgot about it, and then experienced something similar. 1. ____ For example, if you are tired or not paying attention.
2. *It didn't happen, but it wasn't really new, either.* If you had the opportunity to learn about something without experiencing it directly, it may still seem familiar. For example, you read a description of a location, forgot the description, but then saw the actual place. 2. ____
3. *It occurred in a dream.* You dreamed about something, and then had an experience that was similar to the dream. 3. ____ This may also explain the "strange" feeling that accompanies the event.
4. *It isn't real at all.* In this view, the brain isn't working properly. Something has caused the mind to remember something that just isn't real. 4. ____
5. *It happened when I was another person.* For people who believe in reincarnation (the idea that after people die, they're born again in a new body), a *déjà vu* event could be the memory of an experience from a past life. 5. ____
