will: prediction

We use *will* to talk about a future event: something that we think or predict will happen.
We usually use the contraction *won't* (*will not*) for a negative prediction.
After *will* / *won't* we use the infinitive without *to*.

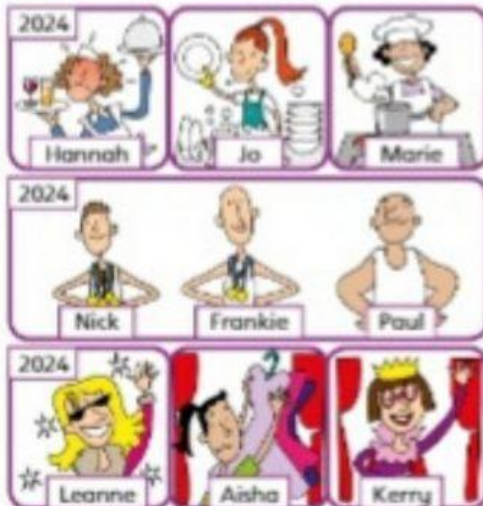
