THE BIG APPLE



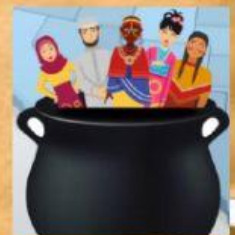
Native Americans lived in this land before the first European settlers arrived in 1624 from the Netherlands. They built a small city called New Amsterdam.

Many immigrants from Germany, Ireland, Italy and other European countries traveled to New York from 1892 to 1954 in order to find a better job and a better life. The statue of Liberty welcomed them because it was the first element they saw when they arrived. It is a symbol of freedom.

As immigrants continued to arrive to New York, a new concept arose: "New York was a melting pot of cultures". This is the reason why New York has a big ethnic diversity. It is one of the most multicultural cities in the world.
