Interviewer: Welcome to another edition of Weather Watch.

Today I'm talking to professional storm chaser, Melissa Compton.

How did you first become interested in extreme weather, Melissa?

Melissa: I _____ in love with storms when I was a little girl. Where I lived in Florida, we _____ hurricanes every few years, not like now when you can have two or three major hurricanes every summer. Interviewer: How did you become a storm chaser?

Melissa: It was while I was at university. I was studying meteorology, which is the study of weather, and part of the course was all about storms. We visited Tornado Alley ...

Interviewer: Can you tell us where Tornado Alley is?

Melissa: Sorry, yes. It's a part of the United States where tornados are most frequent. So, think of the states of Texas, Kansas, Florida, Colorado ... places like that. So, we went to Tornado Alley for ten days and saw so many tornados. I think it was almost one every day.

After this, I loved storms even more and knew that I wanted to become a storm chaser.

Interviewer: What's the worst storm you've ever seen?

Melissa: I think that has to be the Tri-State Tornado of a couple of years back. This storm started in northern Texas and moved on to Oklahoma and then Kansas. I started chasing it when the tornado began and I followed it for 380 kilometres before it died down. That was a pretty cool storm, but it was very scary and it caused a lot of damage – it was hundreds of millions of dollars and lots of people had to be evacuated from their homes.

Interviewer: Do you chase more storms now than you did in the past?

Melissa: Yes, I do. Not so much with tornadoes, but definitely with hurricanes. Every year now they seem to be getting more and more frequent. And stronger. And many more are making landfall.

Interviewer: Landfall? What's that?

Melissa: Well, hurricanes are born in the ocean. Landfall is when they arrive on the land.
