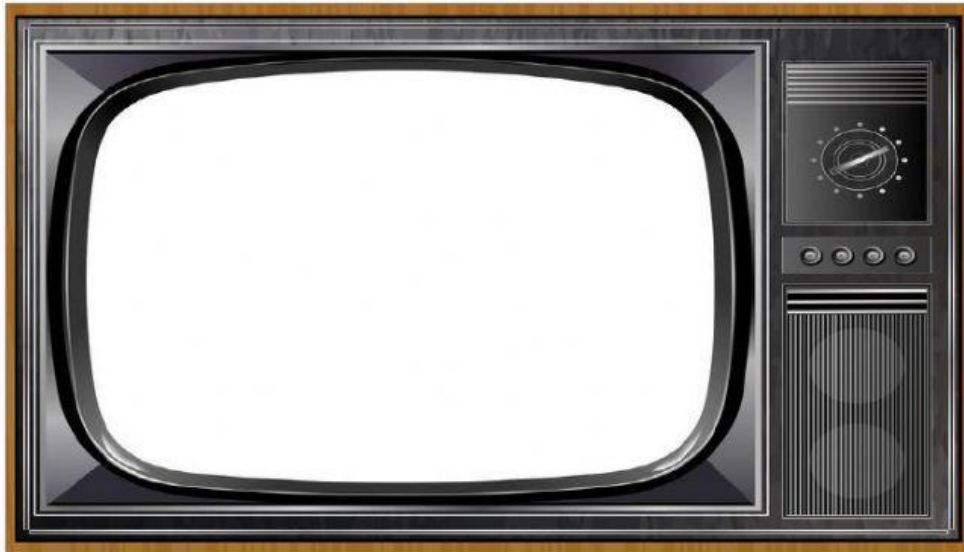


UNDERSTANDING LANGUAGE USE

When do we use past perfect?



What is the correct grammar structure of past perfect tense?

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S + had + past participle + ...

She had finished the test.

-

S + had not/hadn't + past participle + ...

She hadn't finished the test.

?

Had + S + past participle + ...?

Had she finished the test?

Let's read some examples...

Usage

To describe an action finished
before another past action

Describe an action that happened
before a specific time in the past

Example

Richard had gone out when his wife
arrived in the office.

Christine had never been to an opera
before last night.

Usage

To describe cause and effect
(combine with Past Simple)

To emphasize the result of an
activity in the past

Example

I got stuck in traffic because there had
been an accident.

I had been to London twice by the time I
got a job in New York.
