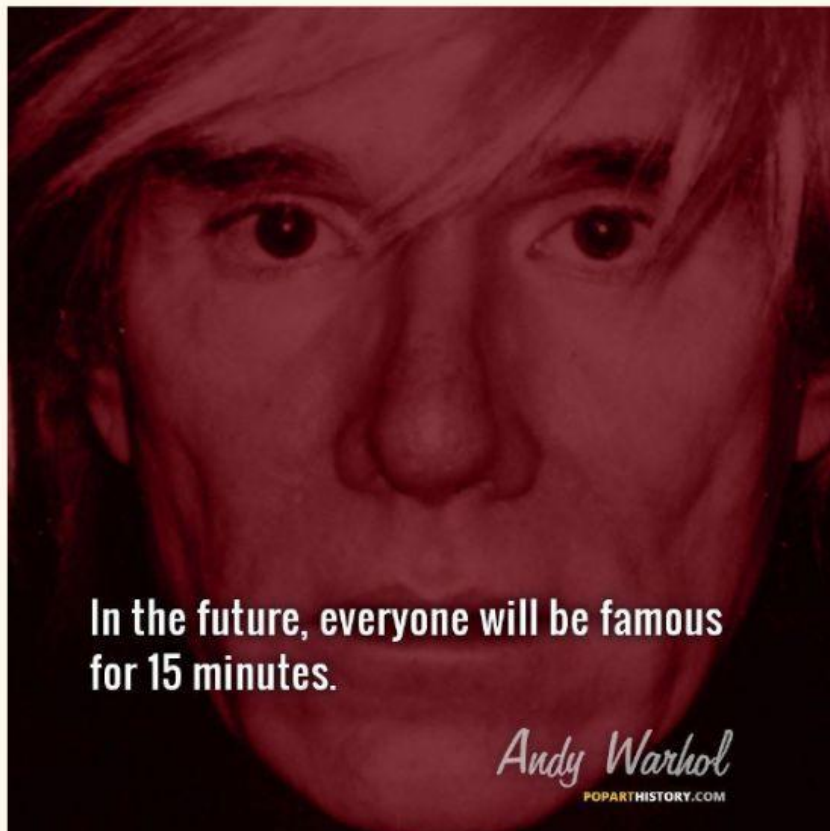


Andy Warhol
