

Four Reasons to Worry about Spam

Most Internet users get irritating, unwanted, commercial messages called *spam* every day. "So what's the big deal?" you may ask. Here are four reasons why you should worry about spam.

1. Spammers send thousands of identical messages with a push of the "send" button, but you have to look through all of your messages and delete the spam. That can add up to a lot of wasted time. Some experts say employees spend up to an hour a day sorting and deleting junk mail.
2. Although improved antivirus software has helped the problem, spam messages can still contain viruses. Sometimes, a spam email will ask you to go to a website and type in personal information. This can be extremely dangerous.
3. Products in spam ads are frequently (though not always) low quality or worthless. Think about it: Companies that make high-quality products don't mind paying for advertising. However, sellers of low-quality goods would rather use spam because it costs very little.
4. Spam messages often say that you asked to receive the message, but, of course, that's usually not true. Many spammers use email addresses without permission. And even though spammers say they'll take your name off their list if you ask them, many of them don't.



Personal Assistant FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions)

- 1. What is a personal assistant (PA)?** A PA manages the daily life of his or her boss. Many PAs work for wealthy people, and celebrities often have PAs.
- 2. What does a PA typically do?** It depends on the employer. Often a PA organizes the employer's daily schedule, makes travel arrangements, pays bills, and runs various errands.
- 3. How much does a PA make?** A PA's salary is usually between \$25,000 and \$75,000 a year.
- 4. How is a PA's job special?** The working relationship between employer and employee usually becomes very close.
- 5. What are the good and bad things of being a PA?** On the good side, PAs often lead exciting and luxurious lives. The downside is that they never have their own life because their employer can call them at any time.
- 6. What is the most important qualification for a job as a PA?** A PA has to be outstanding at personal relationships. A PA has got to know immediately what the employer wants and needs, and be able to carry out that person's wishes.
