 TOO + adjective/adverb + (to infinitive)
 TOO + adjective/adverb + (for somebody)
 TOO MUCH/MANY + noun + (to infinitive)
 (not) + adjective/adverb + ENOUGH + (to infinitive)
 (not) + ENOUGH + (adjective) + noun + (to infinitive)
 (not) + ENOUGH + (adjective) + noun + (that...)

- There are **enough** schools in my area. → the right amount
- There are **not enough** schools in my area. → less than required
