

PAST PERFECT TENSE

FORM

AFFIRMATIVE

Subject+ had+ past participle of the main verb.

NEGATIVE

Subject+ hadn't+ past participle of the main verb.

INTERROGATIVE

Had +subject+ past participle of the main verb.

It's used to talk about events that took place before a specific time in the past:
I had already got married by then.

It's also used to talk about an action that took place before another past action. The action that happened first is put in the Past Perfect and the other one

in the Past Simple:

The film had already begun by the time I arrived at the cinema.

The past perfect is the past of the present perfect, so it is used in a similar way but in a past context.

Who is that girl? I have never seen her before.
I didn't know who she was. I had

never seen her before.

Therefore, this tense is used to report sentences that were said in direct speech using the past simple or the present perfect.

When a sentence in direct speech is in the past perfect we can't change this tense as there is no other tense that can go one more step back into the past.

ALREADY – JUST – NEVER – WHEN – BY THE TIME – AFTER – BEFORE – UNTIL

ALREADY is used in affirmative sentences before the past participle:
I had already rung Mary.
JUST is used before the past participle to mean that something had happened not a long time ago:
I had just left my office.

NEVER is used before the past participle to mean you had not experienced something in your life until a certain time in the past:
I had never eaten caviar until I went to Russia last year.
WHEN is used with the past perfect to show that something is completely finished:

When I had finished the exercises I went out.

BY THE TIME is used with the past simple to state a point in the past before which something else had happened:

By the time I got home the child had already gone to bed.

AFTER, **BEFORE** and **UNTIL** are used with the past simple and past perfect with no difference of meaning:

After he finished the report he went home or After he had finished the report he went home.

He didn't leave until he spoke to his boss or He didn't leave until he had spoken to his boss.
