CHAOTIC CLASSROOM

MEAN TEACHER

MEAN TEACHER

Simile (Compare it to something else using like or as)

E.g Miss Rudy as tall as a tree, casted her shadow over the students as she waltzed into classroom. Everyone scampered back like mice to their seats.

Use a simile

MEAN TEACHER

Personification (Give human qualities)

Even before Miss Rudy step a foot into the classroom, her high heels would send notice of her arrival. Upon hearing the warning, the student would scamper away.

Metaphor (Compare it to something else)
