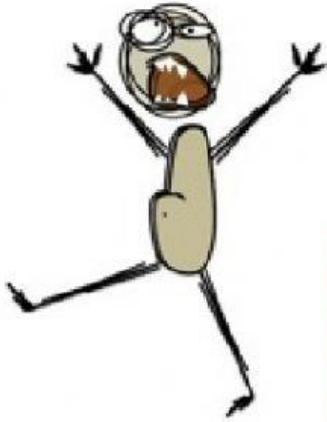

Watch any hollywood movie and within the 15 minute mark, something will happen that will change the character's world! The hero then has to find a way to solve the problem.



Nemo gets caught



Bryan's daughter gets taken!

THIS IS CALLED - INCITING INCIDENT

In a composition, your first paragraph is used to introduce your character's normal world. It's written to get your audience interested in the character. Then, in the second paragraph, we shake that perfect little world - with a problem.

THAT'S WHERE YOU INTRODUCE CONFLICT

3 TYPES OF CONFLICT

Conflict with self

Conflict between 2 characters

Conflict with environment

Conflict with self

A personal struggle in your mind. Should I or should I not cheat? Steal? Break a rule? Overcome my stage fright?

Common compo topics you can use this kind of conflict will be:

- Cheating in an examination
- Theft
- Regret
- Overcoming fear

AN EXAMPLE

I felt **exhilarated** upon seeing my favourite game on the store's shelf. The
shop attendant was busy. This was my perfect chance!
My eyes widened. Sweat dotted my forehead.

EMOTIONAL ADJECTIVE

FACIAL EXPRESSIONS

Should I steal it? What if I get caught? Immediately, my mind started racing.

PERSONAL VOICE

If I could walk away with the game, I could show it off to my friends!

ADVANTAGE

But, what if I get into trouble? That would be awful! As I stared at the game,

DISADVANTAGE

the more my desire increased. Finally, I made a decision. I decided to tuck it into my bag and walk away.
