An Unsolved Crime Continues to Fascinate

The pages of history are full of crimes that have not been solved
1. (not / solve)
Consider, for example, the case of the ship *Mary Celeste*. It had left New York for Italy in November of 1872. About a month later, it was discovered
2. (discover)
floating east of the Azores. No one was found
3. (find)
on board, though everything was determined
4. (determine)
to be in order, and there was no indication why the *Mary Celeste* was abandoned
5. (abandon)
Apparently, in fact, tables had even been set
6. (even / set)
for afternoon tea. However, the lifeboat and most of the ship's papers were missing. One theory speculates that the ship might have been threatened
7. (might / threaten)
by an explosion that was caused
8. (cause)
by fumes from its cargo of alcohol. That theory, however, has never been proven
9. (never / prove)
It doesn't seem an entirely satisfactory explanation, especially since no real evidence of an explosion was apparent. Over the decades, other scenarios have been proposed
10. (propose)
, many involving charges of foul play. One theory states that the *Mary Celeste* was taken over
11. (take over)
by its own crew. Another holds that the ship's personnel were overthrown
12. (overcome)
by pirates. Still another proposes that the ship's personnel were kidnapped
13. (kidnap)
as part of an insurance fraud scheme.

The story of the *Mary Celeste* has been dramatized
14. (dramatize)
in movies, novels, and plays, so much so that it is a challenge to separate fact from fiction. For the time being, at least, the fate of the *Mary Celeste* will have to remain a mystery.
