Possessive Nouns

What is a possessive noun?

A possessive noun is a noun that shows possession. To identify that you are looking at a possessive, reorder the word some other way:

- The dog's bowl is empty?
- The bowl belonging to the dog is empty.
 - o (Dog is possessive because it has something.)

When a word ends in anything *other than the letter s*, you add 's to make it plural. When a word ends in the letter s (such as with most plural nouns), you only need to add an apostrophe.

- The birds' nests were all empty.
- The nests of the birds were all empty.
