

Past simple vs Present Perfect

A) Write the verbs in the correct form (past simple)

Affirmative: subject + verb (2nd column or +ed)

Negative: subject + didn't + verb (infinitive)

Interrogative: Did + subject + verb (infinitive) ...?

- 1) My mother.....to the supermarket yesterday.(go)
- 2) Paul and John.....to the cinema last week. (not go)
- 3) I French when I was 6. (study)
- 4)a car last year? (you/buy)
- 5) Nicolas.....his grandmother two days ago. (visit)

B) Write the correct form of the verbs in brackets. (Present Perfect)

Affirmative: subject + Have/has + verb (3rd column or +ed)

If there is an adverb: subject + have/has + **already** + verb (3^{er} column or +ed)

Just

never

Negative: subject + haven't/hasn't + verb (3^{er} column or + ed)

If there is an adverb: subject + haven't/hasn't + verb (3^{er} column or ed + **Yet**

Subject + **still** + haven't/ hasn't + verb (3^{er} column or + ed)

Interrogative: Have/has + subject + verb (3^{er} column or ed)

If there is an adverb: Have/ Has + subject + verb (3^{er} column or +ed) + **yet**?

Have/ has/subject + **ever** + verb (3^{er} column or +ed)

- 1) I (just/ finish) work.
- 2) My mother.....(already/prepare) dinner.
- 3)(you/ever/ go) skiing?
- 4) They.....(not eat) yet.
- 5) Emma(never/travel) abroad.

C) Write the correct form of the verbs in brackets.(past simple or present perfect)

Remember:

Past simple time expressions: a date in the past 1991, last/ Monday/ month/ year/week, 2 days ago etc, When I....,yesterday.

Present perfect: ever, already, just, still, recently, so far, yet, never, since, for + period of time.

- 1) Yesterday My father and I(walk) 20 km.
- 2) They.....(live) in Merlo since they were born.
- 3) My father.....(die) in 1992.
