

PRESENT PERFECT: JUST, ALREADY, YET

The **PRESENT PERFECT** always connects the past with the present.

A. When used with "**just**" it expresses a **recently completed action**. It is placed between the auxiliary and the main verb. Ex: He has just left the office.

have/has +
past participle

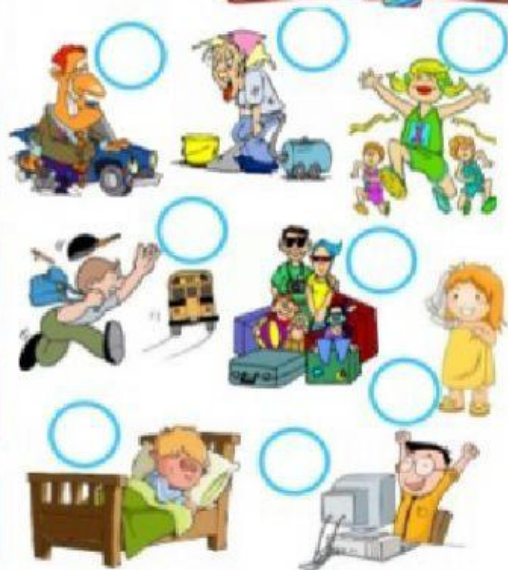

B. When used with "**already**" it describes an **action which happened before or sooner than expected**. It is placed between the auxiliary and the main verb.

C. When used with "**yet**" it describes **something that has not happened but that you expect to happen**. It is placed at the end of a negative sentence.

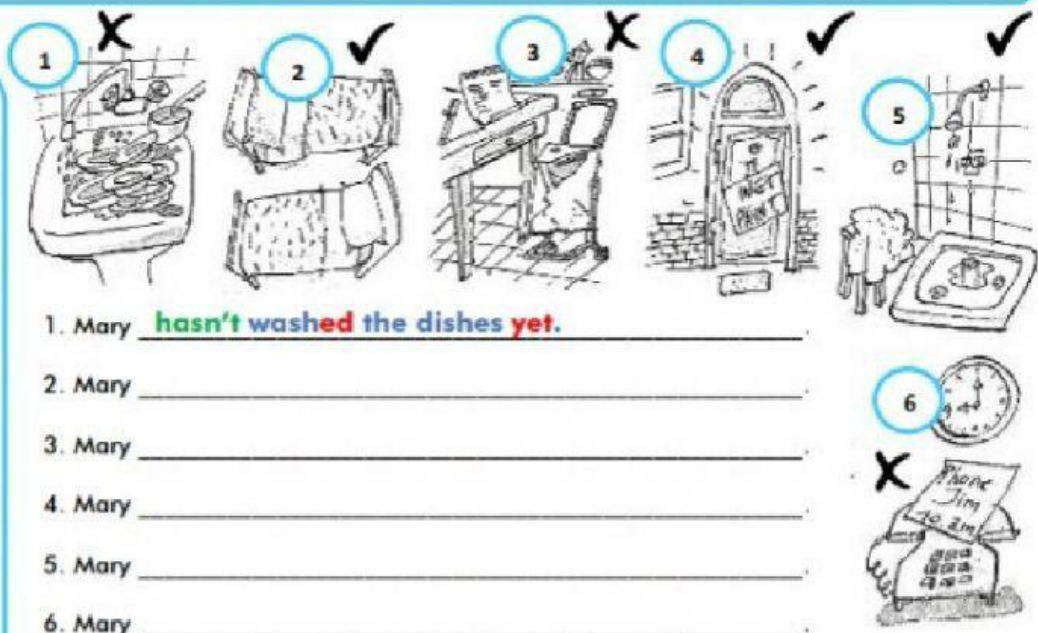
