

REPORTED QUESTIONS

When reporting someone's QUESTIONS we must pay attention to the **WORD ORDER**.

yes/no questions

1. "Is she ready?" → question word order: **VERB + SUBJECT ... ?**

He asked me if she **was** ready. → statement word order: **SUBJECT + VERB ...**

2. "Does she like you?"

He asked me if she **liked** me.

3. "Did she see me?"

He asked me if she **had seen** him.

→ Note that since this is no longer a question we don't need the auxiliary verb **TO DO** anymore!

The main verb changes either into the **SIMPLE PAST** (sentence 2) or the **PAST PERFECT** (sentence 3).

wh- questions

These types of questions follow the same rules above with one difference.

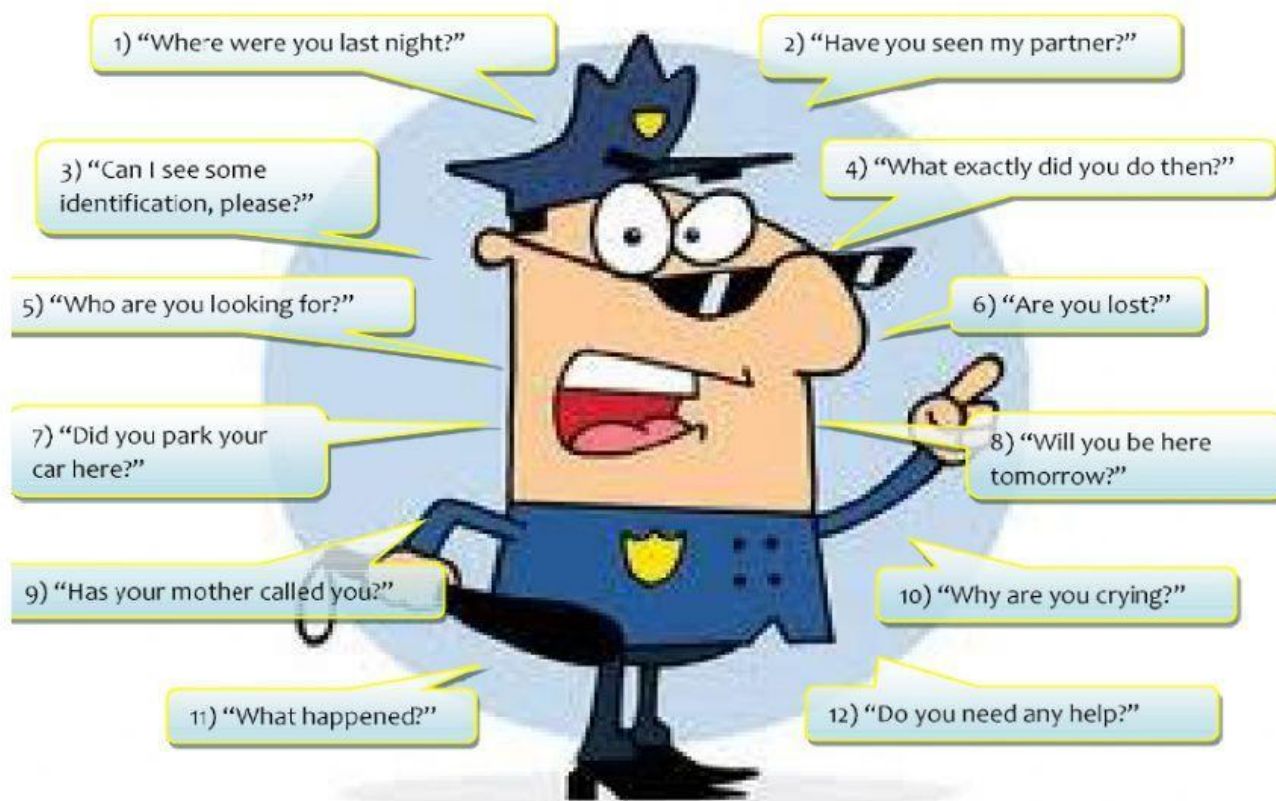
"When **is** she coming?"

He asked me when she **was** coming.

→ The reporting verb is followed by the **QUESTION WORD** (in this case "when")

→ In yes/no questions we must use either **IF** or **WHETHER**.

last week	→	the week before
next year	→	the following year
tomorrow	→	the next day/the following day
here	→	there
this	→	that
these	→	those

PLACE & TIME

Direct Speech	Reported Speech
today	that day
now	then / at the moment
yesterday	the day before
... days ago	... days before
last week	the week before
next year	the following year
tomorrow	the next day the following day
here	there
this	that
these	those
ago	previously / before
tonight	that night

TENSE CHANGE

Direct Speech	Reported Speech
will	would
can	could
must / have to	must or had to
may / might	might
should	should
ought to	ought to
