

'Who' is a subject pronoun like 'he', 'she' and 'they'. We use 'who' to ask which person did an action or which person is in a certain state. 'Whom' is an object pronoun like 'him', 'her' and 'us'. 'Whose' is a possessive pronoun like 'his', and 'our'.
