

Simple Present Tense

Affirmative	Interrogative	Negative
I work	Do I work?	I don't work
You work	Do you work?	You don't work
He work s	Does he work?	He doesn't work
She work s	Does she work?	She doesn't work
It Work s	Does it Work?	It doesn't work
We work	Do we work?	We don't work
You work	Do you work?	You don't work
They work	Do they work?	They don't work

THIRD PERSON SINGULAR (HE, SHE, IT = singular subject)

Rule: We add S to the end of the verb in the 3rd person singular affirmative. In the following cases we add -ES.



THE PRESENT SIMPLE

AFFIRMATIVE

Verbs ending in:

- -ch
- -sh
- -x
- -ss
- -o
- consonant + y

+ -es

We **work** in an office
 You **work** in an office
 They **work** in an office



ATTENTION SPECIAL CASES

He **watches** television.
 He **washes** the dishes.
 She **fixes** radios.
 He **misses** his girlfriend.
 She **goes** to school.
 She **does** his homework.
 He **studies** English.

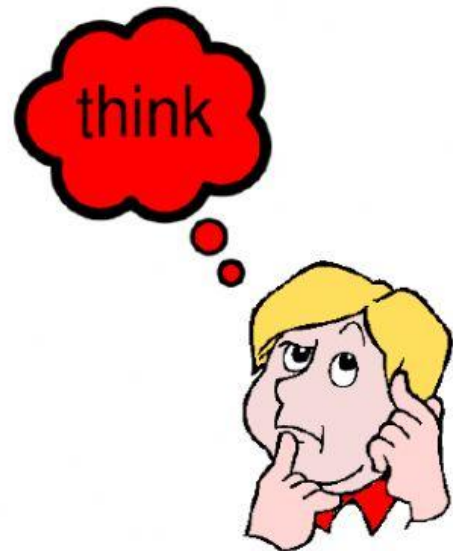
