## CHOOSING A NARRATE TOPIC (PREWRITING)

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Before you begin writing a narrative paragraph or essay, search for a topic to write about. The easiest way to do this is to look for a topic that interests you. You will usually be assigned a general topic from which you can choose to write about a true or a made up experience.


Once you have a general topic, all you need to do is narrow it down. One strategy to help you do this is to use a **topic chart**. The sample topic chart below lists three specific experiences in the first column, and a sequence of related events are listed in the second column.



An Unforgettable Day	Details

Winning a competition	<ul> <li>Performed my talent</li> <li>Finalists called to the stage</li> <li>Winners announced &amp; awards given</li> </ul>

After reviewing the ideas listed, the next step would be to choose the one that interests you the most. In the above example, a check mark is placed next to the one a writer selects.
