A CINQUAIN POEM

Here's an example of a cinquain poem written by a sixth grader about a kitten. Check out how each line follows the rule or guide given.



Line 1: Write a 1-word subject (noun - naming word)	Kitten	
Line 2: Write 2 adjectives (describing words)	Fluffy, cuddly	
Line 3: Write 3 words that express action (verb)	Licking, climbing, clawing	
Line 4: Write 1 phrase about the subject		
Line 5: Write 1 synonym for the subject you wrote on line 1.	Stretched lazily on people's laps
