Adjectives and Adverbs

An adjective is a word that describes a noun or a pronoun such as a person, a place, a thing or an idea.

Examples:

a good doctor. (*describing a person*)

a perfect composition. (*describing a thing*)

a beautiful beach. (*describing a place*)

a bad idea. (*describing an idea*)

An adverb of manner is an adverb that describes how and in what way the action of a verb is carried out.

Examples:

She sings beautifully.

He runs very fast.

I studied hard yesterday.

She dances badly.

happy	happily	Adjectives that finish in -Y change -Y by -I and add LY
noisy	noisily	
easy	easily	
good	well	Irregular forms
hard	hard	
fast	fast
