

THIRD CONDITIONAL

We normally use third conditional sentences to talk about how things could have been different in the past, i.e. for hypothetical / imaginary situations. Compare:

- *Yesterday I got up late and missed the train. (= the real situation)*
- *If I hadn't got up late, I wouldn't have missed my train. (= the hypothetical or imaginary situation)*
