What will she be when she finishes university?
She **will probably** be a nurse.



She **probably won't** be a chef.



She **definitely won't** be a housewife.



We use **will/won't** to show how certain we are about something happening in the future:

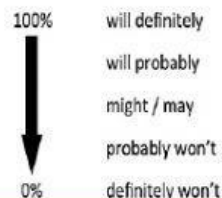
- Mark **will** probably go to France next summer.
- It **definitely won't** rain tomorrow.

The adverb of probability comes **after will**, but before **won't**.

We use **may/might** to show that something is possible in the future.

- I **might** go swimming tomorrow.
- She **may** not get here before the movie starts.

The probabilities can be shown on a scale from certain to happen to not going to happen.
