

Participles

Reminder: A verb tells you what the subject in the sentence is doing or being.

Verbs exist in many forms. One of these forms is the participle.

A participle is a verb form that exists at the present and future tense. It is either used as an adjective or with the verb *to be* to make other verb tenses. (C'est ton participe présent et participe passé en français.)

Ex:

Participle used as an adjective → The child ran to his **loving** father.

Participle used to form another verb tense → I was **walking** alone. (past continuous)

Take the verb *to live*. Its present participle is *living*. To form a present participle, you add -ing. There are little changes to the spelling of the root verb (infinitive) if it does not end in a consonant. live → living: drop the "e" before adding -ing;
work → working: add ing; Sometimes, if the infinitive ends in a consonant, it must be doubled for the participle. plan → planning

Its past participle is *lived*. To form a past participle, you add -ed (or -d if the verb ends in an "e"). live → lived: add -d; work → worked: add -ed; Sometimes, if the infinitive ends in a consonant, it must be doubled for the participle. plan → planned
