

The grey cloud

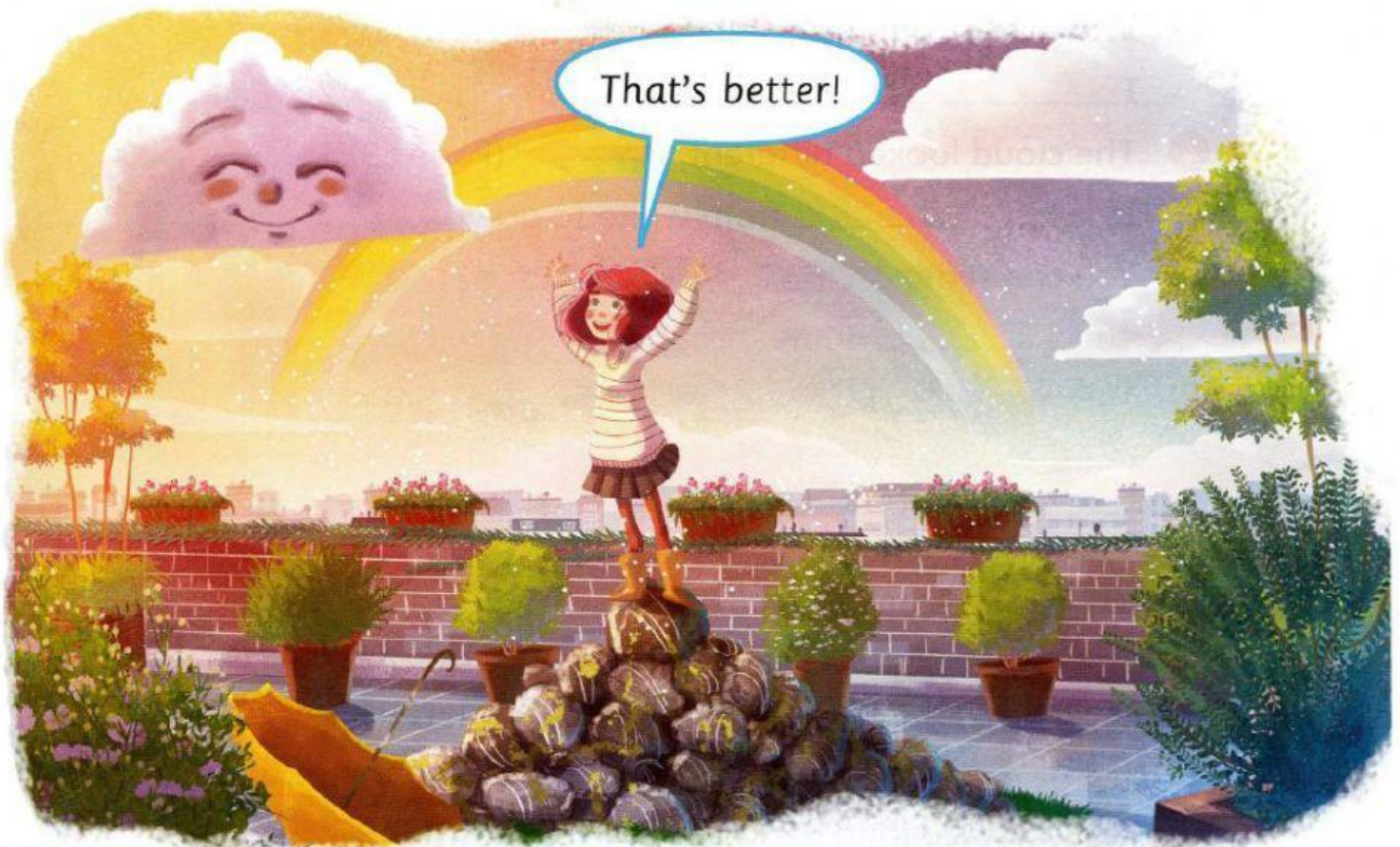


‘Fantastic!’ laughed Lily. ‘Now, Come on! Are you feeling better or worse?’

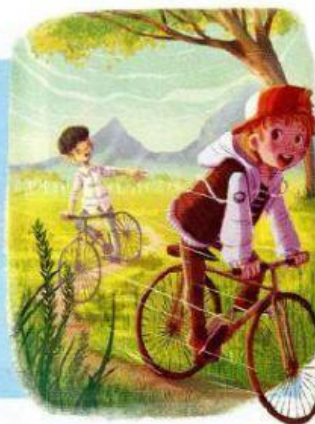
