

Adjectives vs. Adverbs

Reminders:

An **adjective** modifies a noun.

Ex: a **tall** building, a **magnificent** sunset, a **frozen** lake

An **adverb** modifies a verb, an adjective, or another adverb.

Ex: running **slowly**, a **partially** frozen lake, **rather** forcefully spoken

While they have a similar function in the sentence (adding detail), it is important to be able to tell them apart.
