

Possessive Nouns I

REMEMBER THESE RULES:

Singular possessive noun = add 's (always - even if it already ends in an s).

The hat that belongs to the girl. → The girl's hat.

The tusk that belongs to the walrus. → The walrus's tusk.

Plural possessive noun that does not already end in s = add 's.

The feathers that belong to the geese. → The geese's feathers.

Plural possessive noun that already ends in s = just add the ' after the s.

The food that belongs to the cats. → The cats' food.

Possessive nouns are used to show that something belongs to a person, place, or thing (ownership).
