POLICE WATCH

Your monthly round-up of the mad, bad and not-so-dangerous crimes from around the world.

A. One way to impress your future employer

A 14-year-old boy whose favourite pastime was hacking into the confidential computer records of banks and government organizations was finally caught by police last week.

However, rather than receive a prison sentence or fine, the child-criminal has now been offered a job with a software developer specializing in anti-virus programs. The company that made the job offer said the boy had more than met their requirements, but one government minister commented that this kind of reward set a bad example for other youngsters thinking of breaking into systems. The software company defended its decision saying the boy had shown real initiative and that his approach to the crime would be more effective than sending him to juvenile prison.

C. Lock me up - now!

Many burglars are probably prepared to deal with alarms or maybe one or two large dogs at the front door but a burglar in Osaka, Japan, had a surprise when he broke into a house where 15 sumo wrestlers were staying the night. Shiro Morioka, 42, had broken in through the back of the house and climbed into a bedroom in the middle of the night. He was in the process of looking for something to steal when he met a 130-kilo sumo wrestler. That would have been bad enough but Mr Morioka was even more horrified to find that the whole house was full of sumo wrestlers. 'First, I was caught by a massive man. When the lights turned on, I was surrounded by sumo wrestlers,' Mr. Morioka told reporters. He instantly surrendered himself and was relieved when the police took him away to the safety of a police cell.
