


Christmas Legends

Star	A) The plant's connection with romance began with the Celtic Druids who saw it as a symbol of fertility.
Bells	B) One legend says that there was once a man with three daughters who was worried about finding suitable husbands for as he had no money for their dowries. Hearing about the family, St. Nicholas snuck down the chimney and filled the girls' stockings, set by the fire to dry, with gold coins.
Stocking	C) A symbol of peace and of the Holy Spirit
Candy Cane	D) This story from Mexican folklore tells about a girl who wished to bring an offering to her church on Christmas Eve but she had no money. An angel appeared and told the child to gather weeds from the roadside. She did, and when she presented them they miraculously bloomed into bright-red, star-shaped flowers.
Poinsettia	E) German publisher Gerhard Lang is most often credited as the creator of it in the early 1900s, inspired by a box of 24 sweets given to him by his mother when he was a boy; little Gerhard was allowed to eat one a day until Christmas.
Wreath	F) They proclaimed the news of the Saviour's birth
Evergreen Tree	G) The three Wise Men arrived with gifts for the baby Jesus: gold, frankincense, and myrrh.
Angels	H) It is also a symbol representing the star of Bethlehem and there is also a connection with Hanukkah, the Festival of Lights, in Judaism
Advent Calendar	I) It guided the three kings, or wise men, to the baby Jesus. It is also the heavenly sign of a prophecy fulfilled long ago and the shining hope for humanity.
Candle	J) A green, thriving plant in the dead of winter reminded people of hope and new life. Because of Jesus Christ, we can have <i>everlasting</i> life
Mistletoe	K) Its circular shape, one without an end, also came to symbolize eternity and the Christian concept of everlasting life.
Doves	L) They ring out to guide lost sheep back to the flock.
Presents	M) They are a reference to Jesus as the "good shepherd" who tends his flock.
