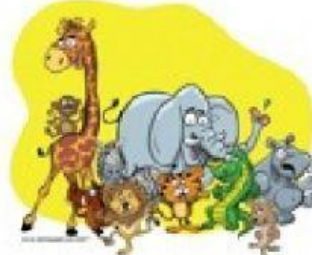


METAPHORS
