



Grammar: CONDITIONALS



Here is a chart to help you : you will visualize the basic English conditionals. Do not take the percentages figures too literally: they only help you to understand.

probability	conditional	example	time
100% ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■	zero conditional	If you smoke , you roughly spend 10€ per packet depending on the brand.	any time
50% ■ ■ ■	first conditional	If I start smoking, I will spend 10€ per pack.	any time
10% ■	second conditional	If I smoked , I would spend 10€ per pack.	future
0 %	third conditional	If Jerry had started smoking in his youth, he would have wasted a lot of money.	past
