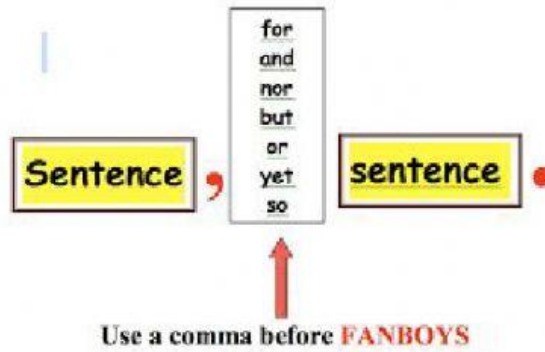




Comma or No Comma?
