

# Possessive Pronouns

Possessive pronouns show ownership or possession of something.



The possessive pronouns *my, your, his, her, its, our, and their* are used before nouns.

EXAMPLE: -

Margaret couldn't find *her* books.



The possessive pronouns *mine, yours, his, hers, ours, and theirs* can stand alone.

EXAMPLES:

It isn't *yours*. The ball is *hers*. *Theirs* are yellow. *Mine* is in the backyard.
